Overview of the Primary Allowances and Benefits (2018 Rates)

PART 1: CAREER TRANSITION SERVICES



Job-finding and business start-up assistance, and career counselling services for serving members and veterans who need support for transitioning to civilian life, as well as for their spouses and survivors

EDUCATION AND TRAINING BENEFIT

A benefit to cover tuition and living expenses payable to veterans with at least 6 years of service (up to \$40,000) or 12 years of service (up to \$80,000)

ART 2: REHABILITATION SERVICES, VOCATIONAL ASSISTANCE AND FINANCIAL BENEFITS



Physical, psychosocial (or combination) rehabilitation services and various taxable income replacement benefits



EARNINGS LOSS BENEFIT¹

Guarantees 90% of gross pre-release salary, until the individual is able to pursue suitable and gainful employment, or until the age of 65 if that is impossible



SUPPLEMENTARY RETIREMENT BENEFIT'

A single payment of 2% of the income earned while in a rehabilitation program to compensate for the difficulty of saving for retirement during rehabilitation



CAREER IMPACT ALLOWANCE

Payable to veterans who have one or more physical or mental health problems that create a permanent and severe impairment. The allowance and its supplement total \$7,315-\$35,393 per year, based on the extent of the impairment



RETIREMENT INCOME SECURITY BENEFIT

Equal to 70% of benefits received before the age of 65, or 35% if the benefit is transferred to the veteran's survivor



CANADIAN FORCES INCOME SUPPORT BENEFIT

Benefit of last resort based on family income

PART 3: CRITICAL INJURY, DISABILITY, DEATH AND DETENTION



Tax-free amounts to recognize and compensate pain and suffering associated with or aggravated by service, and death



DISABILITY AWARD²

Lump sum based on disability rating. A totally disabled individual would receive \$365,400, an individual determined to be 50% disabled would receive \$182,700, etc.



DEATH BENEFIT

Payable to the family of a service member who dies within 30 days of a service-related injury or illness resulting in death. Equal to the maximum disability award amount (\$365,400)



CRITICAL INJURY BENEFIT

Lump sum of \$70,000 to service members and veterans who experienced a severe and traumatic injury or an acute disease caused by a sudden and single service-related event resulting in an immediate and severe impairment and interference in quality of life



DETENTION BENEFIT

Payable to service members or veterans who were detained by a foreign power while serving



AREGIVERS ECOGNITION BENEFIT³

\$1,000 per month payable to the veterandesignated adult who plays an essential role in the provision of ongoing at-home care to the veteran without being remunerated



CLOTHING ALLOWANCE

Up to \$2,513 per year payable to service members and veterans whose injuries cause wear and tear on clothing or require specially made clothing

PART 4: GENERAL



Includes provisions concerning a group health care plan for service members and veterans



Benefit coming into force on 1 April 2018
